At an international early childhood education and care conference in Stockholm in mid-June, the Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) released "Starting Strong", the report of its review of early childhood education and care in 12 countries. "Starting Strong" identified a number of policy lessons learned from the review, including the need for a universal approach to access, the need for substantial public investment in services and ECEC infrastructure and the desirability of a systematic approach to policy and programs.
